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# Frequently Asked Questions

## General

### 1. How do I nominate someone for Mastership or an award?

Read this booklet carefully, especially about the qualifications for Mastership or the award. You may photocopy and submit the optional checklist at the back of the booklet. Arrange **for five detailed letters of support (no more, no less) plus a current, complete curriculum vitae (CV) and full bibliography** or equivalent to be sent together with the checklist by **July 1st**. Supporters are encouraged to keep the appropriate ACP Governor informed and to submit materials electronically for speed and convenience. If material is sent electronically, please do NOT also mail items. (Note different date and number of letters for the Johnson Award. See page 30.)

The role of the nominator is to write a letter of nomination and obtain the four additional letters and the CV. The letters should offer as much new information or viewpoints as feasible and not substantially overlap each other. The nominator should keep track of the letters and make sure they are submitted by the deadline. Letters may be sent all together with the CV or sent separately by the letter-writers.

It is generally better NOT to let the candidate know about the nomination. Both awards and Masterships are competitive, not all those nominated are selected, and those not selected can be disappointed if they find this out. The CV can usually be obtained by gentle subterfuge rather than by direct request from the candidate—such as by contacting the candidate's staff assistant and asking for the CV confidentially on the basis that the candidate is being put up for an award.

### 2. Can chapter awardees be nominated for national awards?

Chapter awardees usually make good candidates for national awards similar to the chapter award that they won. Supporting materials should include the normal five letters and a complete CV. Additional materials may be submitted, such as a brochure about the chapter awardee.

### **3. Who is eligible to be nominated?**

Nominees must be living when nominated and at the time of consideration by the Awards Committee. Officers, Regents, Governors, members of the Awards Committee, ACP Senior Staff and any ACP staff involved with the awards process are not eligible for awards or Masterships during their terms of service, except for Masterships awarded each year to the retiring ACP President and Chair of the Board of Regents. See the Awards and Masterships Requirements Table, near the end of this booklet, for eligibility relating to specific awards.

### **4. Can someone apply directly for Mastership or an award?**

No. These honors are conferred by nomination from peers, mentors, and others. One cannot apply or self-nominate.

### **5. Who can write a supporting letter?**

Although most supporting letters tend to come from ACP Fellows and Masters, anyone who knows the nominee may write a supporting letter. Supporters need not be in the same Chapter as the nominee, need not be an ACP member, and need not be a physician. Letters from the nominee's ACP Governor are encouraged. All ACP staff except Senior Staff or ACP staff involved in the awards process may nominate and write supporting letters for others, so long as the nominee is not ACP staff. For teaching awards, some letters may come from current or former trainees of the nominee. See the following section on writing nominating and supporting letters and the model letter.

### **6. What happens if a person is not selected?**

Usually a nomination is considered automatically for a total of 3 years. The original package of five letters is reconsidered for the second and third years. Please note that it enhances the candidate's nomination if **up to two** additional letters (one from the nominator) plus an updated CV are sent in for each successive year. The two new letters should offer new information and/or a different viewpoint and not duplicate material from earlier letters. It is up to the nominator to arrange for additional letters and updated CV. These are not required, however. Nominators who would like guidance in enhancing nominations are encouraged to contact the Awards Committee Staff Liaison for suggestions.

### **7. Who is responsible for the awards and Mastership process?**

The awards and Masterships process is under the jurisdiction of the ACP Awards Committee, which reports directly to the Board of Regents. Implementation is handled by staff in the Membership Division at ACP Headquarters.

## **8. Who all have been honored by awards and Masterships over the course of ACP's history?**

The living awardees and Masters are listed later in this booklet. The "In Memoriam" section under each category honors those who passed away recently. The complete lists of all Masters and awardees may be viewed on ACP Online, at [www.acponline.org/about\\_acp/history/leaders/](http://www.acponline.org/about_acp/history/leaders/).

## **9. Who do I go to for questions and concerns?**

Anyone wishing to contact their own supporters can prepare a memo or general letter, which will then be forwarded to the supporters by ACP staff.

## **Mastership**

### **1. What are the qualifications for Mastership?**

Please see page 33 of this booklet. Candidates should be highly accomplished individuals, distinguished by the excellence and significance of their contributions to the field of medicine. Please note that for Mastership, ACP involvement is expected, with rare exceptions. **Also, please note that Mastership, like awards, is competitive. Only a limited number of Masterships are given each year, and the most outstanding candidates are selected by comparison.**

### **2. What does receiving Mastership entail?**

New Masters are expected to be inducted at the Convocation ceremony following their selection, and they receive a special "Master" academic hood during the ceremony. Convocation is held during the ACP Annual Meeting in the spring. An honorarium of \$1,000 is sent in February to help defray travel expenses. After induction, new Masters may use the initials MACP after their name, for Master of the ACP. More broadly, new Masters are considered role models and are encouraged to become more active in the College, especially in their chapter.

## **Awards**

### **1. What are the qualifications for awards?**

Please see the page for the specific award plus the Awards and Masterships Requirements and Conditions for Ineligibility Table, on pages 52-53.

### **2. What does receiving an award entail?**

Unless otherwise indicated, new awardees are expected to participate in the Convocation ceremony following their selection, and they receive an engraved plaque or a similar item during the ceremony. Most awards also bestow a small honorarium plus reimbursement of travel expenses. Two awards stipulate that a lecture be given at the Annual Meeting. Contact the Awards Committee Staff Liaison (see contact information above) for more details about specific awards.

Dear Colleague:

The Awards Committee of the American College of Physicians invites your assistance in recognizing the accomplishments of distinguished individuals in the practice of medicine, teaching, research, public service, and volunteerism. In making your nominations, the Committee encourages you to consider a wide array of outstanding candidates including women, international medical graduates, underserved minorities, other ethnic groups, and international members and colleagues.

Instructions for awards and Masterships nominations are found on the following pages; please read the FAQs preceding this letter. The nominations for the 2009–10 cycle are due **July 1, 2009**. New nominations require five detailed letters of support (no more, no less) plus a current, complete curriculum vitae and full bibliography. (However, see different requirements for the Johnson Award, page 30.) Note that Masterships as well as awards are highly competitive. Because only a limited number are given each year, only the most outstanding candidates are selected. Although technically Mastership is a class of ACP membership, it is handled more like an award, not like Fellowship. **Individuals should not self-nominate or, if nominated, should not be involved in the process. Only ACP Fellows may be nominated for Mastership.** The information provided for all nominations is confidential.

All nomination materials should be sent to the Awards Committee Chair via ACP Headquarters as described on page 8. The Awards Committee reviews all the nominations annually and presents the slate of recommended candidates to the Board of Regents at its fall meeting. The Board approves the final candidates. The names of the winners are not released until all winners have accepted the award or Mastership, normally around December 1. (Only successful candidates are personally notified.) ACP leadership, members, and all supporters are then notified about the winning candidates in early December. The complete list of those selected is also made available on ACP Online. No information about supporters is ever released. The College President and the Chair of the Board of Regents present the award or Mastership during the following annual Convocation. (See timeline at the end of this letter.)

If a candidate is not selected in the first year nominated, the nomination is automatically considered for two additional years. Although not required, the Awards Committee strongly encourages the submission of up to two additional or updated letters (one from the nominator) plus an updated CV for each successive year. The additional letters should offer new information and/or different viewpoints and not duplicate material from earlier letters. The additional materials are not required, however.

The deadline for receipt of nominations for the 2009–10 selection is **July 1, 2009** (except for the Johnson Award). ## Instructions for Writing Nominating and Supporting Letters for Awards and Mastership Candidates

The Awards Committee wants to emphasize that all letters on behalf of nominations for ACP Masterships and awards are **extremely important**. A total of **five detailed** letters (no more, no less) is required for a new nomination. (However, a minimum of three letters is required for the Johnson Award—see page 30.) Letters may come from all classes of College membership or from any individual (physician or not) familiar with the nominee. Letters signed by more than one sponsor count as one letter. Letters from the nominee's ACP Governor are encouraged.

A copy of the nominee's current curriculum vitae and complete bibliography, or equivalent, are also required for consideration. In the case of an organization, a detailed descriptive brochure and/or descriptive narrative is required.

Letters, when taken together, should address the pertinent following topics, especially in relation to the qualifications for a particular award or Mastership. Impacts on the field of medicine, on institutions, and on medical professionals should also be specified. Depending on the award and the nominee, not all of these categories may apply.

- Current and past positions
- Contributions to medicine and/or a specific subspecialty
- Contributions to ACP, locally and nationally (especially for Mastership)
- Work with other medical societies
- Contributions to the community (e.g., assistance to Hurricane Katrina evacuees or work with victims of domestic violence)
- Research grants and projects
- Teaching accomplishments
- Publications
- Principal professional interests
- Awards and honors
- Volunteer work, medical and otherwise

Letters should not simply summarize the curriculum vitae or consist of a few paragraphs stating that the individual is worthy. Nor should letters repeat the same material recounted in other letters. It is important that the letter-writer be enthusiastic about the nominee, sincerely believe him or her to be worthy of the honor, and then support this enthusiasm and conviction with detailed information and examples. In recruiting other supporters for a nominee, it is important to ask individuals who are genuinely enthusiastic and who honestly believe that the nominee is worthy of the award or Mastership. Letters should come from the personal viewpoint and experience of the letter-writer regarding the nominee and may include, as appropriate, personal stories and anecdotes illustrating qualities pertaining to the honor under nomination.

If the nominee has strong teaching qualifications (for Mastership or for an award relating to teaching), it is often appropriate to have one or more letters from current or former students/trainees of the nominee. (See especially the requirements for the Jane F. Desforges Distinguished Teacher Award on page 20 and the Outstanding Volunteer Clinical Teacher Award on page 25.)

Officers, Regents, Governors, members of the Awards Committee, ACP Senior Staff, and ACP staff involved in the awards process are not eligible to be nominated for awards or Masterships during their terms of service, except for Masterships awarded each year to the retiring ACP President and Chair of the Board of Regents. However, all ACP staff, except Senior Staff or staff involved in the awards process, may nominate and write supporting letters for others, so long as the nominee is not an ACP staff member. Deadline for receipt of all materials is July 1, 2009, for awards and Masterships presented in 2010. (Note the exception for the Johnson Award—see page 30.) Materials received after this date will be held over for review and considered in the following year's cycle.

Nominators are encouraged to submit materials electronically via e-mail for speed and convenience. If material is sent by e-mail, please do NOT also mail items. An optional Checklist for Nomination is included at the back of this booklet, which may be photocopied and submitted. Please do not contact the Awards Committee Chair directly, either with materials or with inquiries.

Please note a clarification about Mastership. Sometimes it is thought that Mastership operates like Fellowship—if a distinguished individual exceeds certain criteria, then Mastership is likely. However, although Mastership is technically a class of ACP membership, it is handled like an award. More specifically, Mastership is competitive. Thus, no matter how distinguished a nominee may be to those writing supporting letters, there may be other nominees who are equally or more accomplished. The relative ranking of a nominee in any given year will always depend on a comparison among the qualifications of all the nominees. Please note also that because Mastership is handled like an award, it is handled confidentially. **Individuals should not self-nominate or, if nominated, should not be involved in the process. Only ACP Fellows may be nominated for Mastership.**

In keeping with the College's Diversity Policy, the Committee encourages you to consider a wide array of outstanding candidates, including women, underserved minorities, other ethnic groups, and international members and colleagues.

Prospective nominators and supporters are encouraged to work with, or inform, the local ACP Governor appropriate to the nominee's chapter jurisdiction. Many Chapters have awards committees that coordinate nominations for that Chapter.

## Model Letter

The following model letter is a composite based partly on actual letters submitted for the Awards Committee's review. It is intended as a guide. Not all paragraphs may be applicable to any one candidate. Please add, delete, or change headings and customize as appropriate to convey the best features of a nominee in relation to the award or Mastership. If the supporter's experience is specific to certain areas of a nominee's background, the letter should focus in detail on those areas rather than attempting to cover all the possible headings. Letters should not overlap substantially but present new information.

Please note that letters should not simply summarize the curriculum vitae or consist of a few paragraphs stating that the individual is worthy. It is important for the letter-writer to be enthusiastic about the nominee, sincerely believe him or her to be worthy of the honor, and then support this enthusiasm and conviction with detailed information and examples. Letters should come from the personal viewpoint and experience of the letter-writer regarding the nominee and may include, as appropriate, personal stories and anecdotes illustrating qualities pertaining to the honor under nomination. Someone who is invited to write a letter for a nominee but is not enthusiastic about that individual should politely decline or suggest another supporter.

I am very pleased to write a letter in support of the nomination of my friend and mentor Dr. \_\_\_\_ for [name of award or Mastership] in the American College of Physicians. He/she presented posters at the chapter meeting for three years running, chaired the chapter's Associate Committee, and represented the Chapter in the annual medical "Jeopardy" finals during ACP's annual meeting in [year]. He/she regularly rounds on inpatients twice daily, and his/her outpatient practice has a very high new patient accrual with an incredibly low turnover. Dr. \_\_\_ has received numerous praise in every survey of patient and referring physician satisfaction. His/her patients revere him/her, and the group includes hospital employees, university professors, and leaders in the local business community. At group discussions of interesting cases, he/she can always be counted on to describe a truly fascinating case during which he/she clearly treated the patient with great care and warmth.

**EDUCATIONAL AND TEACHING SERVICE:** Dr. \_\_\_'s career has involved all levels of teaching, from first- and second-year students first encountering clinical problems to third- and fourth-year students, to interns and residents, and finally to postdoctoral fellows. Year after

year, his/her evaluations are among the highest in the internal medicine department. For 20 consecutive years, students and residents have ranked him/her among to top five teaching faculty. Alumni frequently comment that Dr. \_\_\_ is an outstanding lecturer and teacher at rounds, a superb outpatient clinic instructor, and one of a select few faculty who help shape their career. He/she has received a number of teaching awards, including [examples]. In addition, Dr. \_\_\_ designed a model curriculum for [area of knowledge] and developed a number of innovative lectures for addressing state-of-the-art treatment of current problems in [area of knowledge].

## **John Phillips Memorial Award for Outstanding Work in Clinical Medicine**

## **James D. Bruce Memorial Award for Distinguished Contributions in Preventive Medicine**

The James D. Bruce Memorial Award was established by the Board of Regents on October 20, 1946. Dr. Bruce was a Governor, Regent, and President of the College. The award is supported by an endowment from his estate.

## Richard and Hinda Rosenthal Awards from The Rosenthal Family Foundation

The Richard and Hinda Rosenthal Awards from The Rosenthal Family Foundation were established by the Board of Regents in November 1976.

The first award is given “to that physician–scientist, clinician, or scientific group whose recent innovative work is making a notable contribution to improve clinical care in the field of internal medicine.” Oncology is not included, as The Rosenthal Family Foundation sponsors an award in that field.

## **American College of Physicians Award for Diversity and Access to Care**

The American College of Physicians Award for Diversity and Access to Care was established by the Board of Regents on October 25, 2008.

The award is given to an ACP member with outstanding accomplishments in advancing diversity in clinical medicine or research, or in access to care in relation to diverse populations. Activities must pertain predominantly to work in the United States. "Diverse populations" are understood to include: 1) economically or socially disadvantaged patient populations, for example, minorities, immigrant groups, or the homeless; and 2) groups underrepresented in the health care workforce.

## **Samuel Eichold II Memorial Award for Contributions in Diabetes**

The Samuel Eichold II Memorial Award for Contributions in Diabetes was established by the Board of Regents on October 25, 2008. The award honors the late Dr. Eichold, whose lifelong passion was diabetes, and is supported by a grant from the Eichold family.

The award is given to a member of the American College of Physicians or to an organization that has made important health care delivery innovations for diabetic patients resulting in improved clinical or economic outcomes; or a member of the ACP who has conducted research that significantly improves quality of care or clinical management of diabetes. The Eichold Award is designed to honor Dr. Eichold and also recognize Dr. Eichold's high regard for the ACP Alabama Chapter.

## **Key Contact of the Year Award**

The Key Contact Award program recognizes those members who have made exceptional contributions to advance the College's public policy agenda. Key Contacts communicate as constituents with their members of Congress on issues of importance to internists and their patients and to medical students. The College has over 5,500 Key Contacts who partner with ACP's Washington office.

The award recipient is chosen on the basis of the quality and quantity of responses to the ACP's congressional legislative alerts, writing editorials and letters to the editor, meeting with his or her members of Congress, expanding chapter federal advocacy efforts, recruiting Key Contacts, and organizing Leadership Day visits and other meetings with legislators.

The Key Contact of the Year Award is presented at the College's annual Leadership Day Awards dinner held in Washington, DC. In addition, the recipient is recognized at the following year's Convocation.

Staff in the ACP Washington office selects the Key Contact Award recipient. The deadline is approximately two months prior to ACP's Leadership Day event in May. Nominees must be registered ACP Key Contacts who have actively participated in federal advocacy during the past year.

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## MACP® Mastership

The first Mastership in the College was presented in 1923 to Dr. James M. Anders, who served the College as President for two terms. He was recognized for his extraordinary service to the College and for being one of the most outstanding internists and medical teachers of his day.

ACP bylaws state that Masters shall be Fellows who have been selected because of “personal character, positions of honor, contributions towards furthering the purposes of the ACP, eminence in practice or in medical research, or other attainments in science or in the art of medicine.” Masters must be highly accomplished individuals. Evidence of their achievements can come from many types of endeavors, such as research, education, health care initiatives, volunteerism, and administrative positions. The Master must be distinguished by the excellence and significance of his or her contributions to the field of medicine.

For Mastership, ACP involvement is expected, with rare exceptions. This may include, for example, service to the College in an official capacity, participation in chapter activities, and involvement in the development of College products and educational programs.

Each year, a number of individuals at the very top of their fields are nominated for Mastership, but not all are selected. If a nominee is not selected, two additional supporting letters (one from the nominator) plus an updated CV are encouraged but not required for each succeeding year. After being presented a third time, an unsuccessful nominee is dropped from the eligibility roster and all new materials are required for that nominee to be reconsidered.

Please note that Masterships, as well as awards, are competitive. That is, only a limited number are given each year and the most outstanding are selected by comparison. Moreover, although Mastership is technically a class of ACP membership, it is handled confidentially like an award, not like Fellowship. **Individuals should not self-nominate or, if nominated, should not be involved in the process.**
