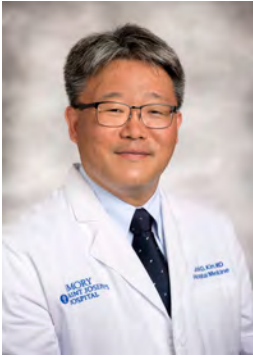

Joyce A. Akwe, MD, MPH, FACP



Dr. Joyce Akwe is the Chief of Hospital Medicine at the Atlanta VA Health Care System (Atlanta VAHCS), an Associate Professor of Medicine at Emory University School of Medicine and an Adjunct Faculty with Morehouse School of Medicine in Atlanta GA.

After Medical school Dr. Akwe worked for the World Health Organization and then decided to go back to clinical medicine. She completed her internal medicine residency and chief resident year at Morehouse School of Medicine. After that, she joined the Atlanta Veterans VAHCS Hospital Medicine team and has been caring for our nation's Veterans since then.

Dr. Akwe has built her career in service and leadership at the Atlanta VA HealthCare System, but her influence has extended beyond your work at the Atlanta VA, Emory University, and Morehouse School of Medicine. She has mentored multiple young physicians and continuous to do so. She has previously been recognized by the Chapter for her community service (2010), teaching (as recipient of the 2014 J Willis Hurst Outstanding Bedside Teaching Award), and for your inspirational leadership to younger physicians (as recipient of the 2018 Mark Silverman Award). James A. Kruer, MD, FACP



James (Jim) Kruer, MD, FACP is the inaugural program director of the Internal Medicine Residency program at Northeast Georgia Medical Center (NGMC), a large program which has achieved ongoing accreditation for 60 physician slots. In his fifth year of service, Dr. Kruer has received approval to expand his program even more to 72 positions,

which will be filled with residents dedicated to a new Primary Care Track Residency program, starting July 2023. The Primary Care Track is intended to further the pipeline of excellent primary care doctors, a tremendous need in the state of Georgia.

Since achieving accreditation for the Internal Medicine Residency program, Dr. Kruer has assisted in building several fellowship programs at NGMC in high-demand specialties: Cardiovascular Disease, Hospice and Palliative Medicine, Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine and Infectious Disease.

Dr. Kruer continuously mentors faculty to pursue fellow (FACP) status within the ACP and is an active member of the GAACP Wellness Committee and the Membership Committee.

Dr. Kruer has also sponsored and encouraged his residents to become active in chapter leadership positions. The program is one of the most active programs with submissions of scholarly abstracts to the chapter meetings.

Dr. Kruer is proud to share in the mission to train more physicians in Georgia, with the goal of retaining as many as possible to stay and practice medicine in our state.

J. Willis Hurst Outstanding Bedside Teacher Award

John Erikson Yap, MD is currently an assistant professor of medicine and the associate program director of gastroenterology fellowship at the Medical College of Georgia at Augusta University.

He did his training as a resident, chief medical resident and GI fellow at Cook County Health and Hospital System in Chicago. He is triple board certified in internal medicine, gastroenterology and obesity medicine. Dr. Yap is also a core faculty member of the Adult Cystic Fibrosis Center at Augusta University and serves as their gastroenterologist. He is expected to complete his MBA degree this year and has been inducted to the Beta Gamma Sigma Honor Society for academic excellence.

Dr. Yap specializes on advanced luminal endoscopic procedures including complex polypectomy, endoscopic suturing and ablation of lesion either via radiofrequency or cryoablation. He is very active in mentoring students, residents and fellows clinically and in research. In fact, he has had over 100 accepted abstracts presented at local and national conferences and more than 20 manuscript publications since joining as an MCG faculty in 2018.

His particular research interest is endoscopic safety and obesity. He has given several lectures to medical student, physician assistant, residents and fellows of various subspecialties, and even practicing providers. He is also part of several sponsored study grants.
