Dear President Trump and Secretary Noem:

As medical and mental health clinicians and providers for children and families, we write to raise our serious concerns about news reports that the detention of children and families has resumed. Family detention puts the health and safety of children and their parents at risk and, as we urged the Biden administration, we urge you to abandon any effort to detain families in Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) facilities.

Immigrant children seeking safe haven in the United States should never be placed in ICE detention facilities. There is no evidence that any amount of time in detention is safe for children and detention itself poses a threat to child health.<sup>i,ii</sup> In fact, even short periods of detention can cause psychological trauma and long-term mental health risks.<sup>iii</sup> Studies of detained immigrants have shown that children and parents may suffer negative physical and emotional symptoms from detention, including anxiety, depression, and posttraumatic stress disorder.<sup>iv,v</sup> Parents in detention centers have described regressive behavioral changes in their children, including decreased eating, sleep disturbances, clinginess, withdrawal, self-injurious behavior, and aggression.<sup>vi</sup> Detention itself undermines parental authority and the capacity to respond to their children's needs.<sup>vii</sup> Further, family detention facilities have historically been unable to provide medical and mental health care that meets generally recognized standards.

DHS's immigration enforcement practices should operationalize the presumption that detention is generally neither appropriate nor necessary for families— and that detention or the separation of families for purposes of immigration enforcement or management are never in the best interest of children. In every immigration policy decision affecting children and families, government decision-makers should prioritize the best health interests of the child and of the entire family.<sup>viii</sup>

Thank you for your attention to this important issue. We stand ready to work with you to ensure the health and safety of immigrant families is safeguarded.
