

2023 Abstract/Poster Competition Guidelines

SUBMISSION DEADLINE: Friday, September 1, 2023 at 11:59 pm. No late entries. Visit: https://forms.acponline.org/webform/arizona-chapter-abstract-form to submit your abstract. 500-word maximum This information is also available on the ACP Arizona website

Only <u>one</u> abstract poster per author as "first author" will be accepted. No exceptions. Duplicate cases may not appear on separate posters during the same competition.

The ACP Arizona Abstract/Poster Competition types include:

Basic Research

To improve human health, scientific discoveries must be translated into practical applications. Such discoveries typically begin at the bench with basic research – in which scientists study disease at a molecular or cellular level.

• Clinical Research

Patient-oriented research. Research conducted with human subjects (or on material of human origin such as tissues, specimens and cognitive phenomena) for which an investigator (or colleague) directly interacts with human subjects. This area of research includes: mechanisms of human disease; therapeutic interventions; clinical trials; development of new technologies; analysis of existing datasets; epidemiologic and behavioral studies; outcomes research and health services research.

• Quality Improvement – Patient Safety

Submissions can report on efforts to improve patient safety or outcomes measurement. Such efforts may be projects developed and initiated to promote patient safety and/or processes that have improved or created a safer environment for patients. Abstracts may also be submitted that relate to the use of outcome data and how to measure and convert data into information.

• High-Value Care

Projects that focus on: reducing waste in the system (unnecessary testing and treatment or inappropriate setting for care), minimizing harm (radiation exposure, medication side effects) or improving patient care through communication (incorporating patient values and concerns into care plans).

• Clinical Vignette

A clinical vignette is a report of one or more cases that illustrates a new disease entity, or a prominent or unusual clinical feature of an established disease. It may include a summary of pertinent patient history, physical findings, laboratory data or management description.

A presenter must be:

- <u>A medical student in good standing</u> at an Arizona medical school or a <u>PGY-1 to PGY-3 in good standing</u> at an Arizona Internal Medicine residency program
- <u>Registered to attend the meeting</u>. (Resident registration fee is \$25) Medical student registration is free.
- <u>An ACP member</u> (you will need your ACP# to submit your abstract). **Medical students join for free at** <u>https://www.acponline.org/membership</u>

Format

- 1. Abstracts must be submitted on the official online abstract form, with a **500-word maximum**.
- 2. Presenting author must list their name first and the name of the institution, then list name and one degree (i.e., MD, DO) for each author.

The body of the abstract should be organized as follows:

- 1. Purpose for study (one sentence if possible) or introduction to the case
- 2. Simple statement of methods or case description
- 3. Summary of results (adequate to support conclusions) or discussion
- 4. Statement of conclusions (Do not use phrases such as "The results will be discussed")

The Poster Judging Process is guided by the following rules and principles:

- Each poster must be a unique submission. Duplicate cases may not appear on separate posters.
- Poster size may not exceed 48 inches by 48 inches. <u>Posters that are too large may not be displayed</u>.
- To impart additional information and images to the poster viewer, QR codes may be included. However, the QR codes will not be part of judging the poster.
- A team of 3 judges will be assigned to review a set of posters as a group.
- Judges will not judge posters from their own institution.
- Presenters will stand by their poster until the team of judges joins them during the identified poster judging time blocks. <u>No specific time will be assigned</u>.
- Rankings will be based on the number of points obtained.
- Presenters will have 3-4 minutes to present the poster. Be prepared to answer 1 or 2 questions.
- <u>Substitute presenters not listed on your abstract will not be accepted.</u>

Poster Session II:	Saturday, October 28, 2023	12:40 pm – 2:00 pm

When you submit your abstract, you will be asked to make a date preference (Poster Session I or Poster Session II). All possible efforts will be made to accommodate your request, however, it is possible that your request may not be met.

Winners will be announced at the Annual Meeting closing session – Saturday, October 28 at 4:30 pm

All presenters are expected to be present for the Awards portion of the meeting. A list of Poster Session Awards will be listed on the Arizona Chapter website.

NEW 2023 Abstract/Poster Process Update

ACP Arizona has created this additional step in order to improve the in-person judging process.

After the September 1 deadline, <u>resident</u> abstracts will be sorted by program and sent to the appropriate program director for review. Each PD will be asked to select the best abstracts to represent their program. (The actual number for each program will be determined based on the total number of abstracts submitted and the size of the program.) The abstracts chosen by the PDs will be judged in person during the ACP Arizona 2023 Annual Meeting.

ALL RESIDENT POSTERS CAN BE PRESENTED AT THE ACP ARIZONA ANNUAL MEETING, but **only those chosen specifically by the PDs in this process will be judged.** The first author will be notified about the status of the poster once the PDs have made their choice.

All medical student posters will be judged.
