Chinedu Ivonye, MD, FACP



Associate Dean for Graduate Medical Education

for Morehouse School of Medicine

Dr. Ivonye is responsible for the oversight and administration of each of the ACGME-accredited programs, as well as for ensuring compliance with the ACGME institutional, common, specialty/subspecialty, and recognition requirements. He carries out the strategic mission and vision of Morehouse School of Medicine and Morehouse Healthcare by coordinating clinical training for residents and strengthening relationships with partnering hospitals and health systems. Dr. Ivonye is also the Designated Institutional Official and has authority and oversight over all current training programs in the Atlanta area.

Dr. Ivonye is a Professor in the Department of Internal Medicine at Morehouse School of Medicine. He currently serves as the Vice Chair, Program Director of the Internal Medicine Residency Program, and Chief of General Internal Medicine. Dr. Ivonye is Chair of the resident's research oversight committee, Chair of the departmental promotions committee, and Co-Chair of the Grady Care Logistics and Patient's Aggregation project. Additionally, he serves as the course director for the Internal Medicine longitudinal board review. Dr. Ivonye is the recipient of the Morehouse Graduate Medical Education Faculty of the Year Award, Dean's Teaching and Service Awards. He is also the recipient of the J. Willis Hurst Award for Excellence in Teaching, Bedside Medicine, and Mentoring and the Mark Silverman Award for Patient Care, Leadership and Teaching from the Georgia American College of Physicians.

An internationally recognized and renowned scholar, Dr. Ivonye is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians. A sought-after speaker, Dr. Ivonye has presented at several national and international conferences and meetings. He's authored numerous publications in peer reviewed journals, including a bestselling Internal Medicine Board Review book. Additionally, Dr. Ivonye participates in national exam writing and education and curriculum committees.

Walter J. Moore Leadership Award

The American College of Physicians Georgia Chapter Leadership Award, established in 2003, honors key leaders whose contributions embody the core principles of ACP to enhance the quality and effectiveness of health care, public health policy, and/or medical education.

In 2021, the Chapter renamed the leadership award after the late Col. Walter J. Moore, MD, MACP, a beloved former Governor of the Georgia Chapter and former Chair of its Awards Committee. He was a quintessential leader among his peers and a decorated medical educator and rheumatologist. He served the military, the Medical College of Georgia, and the Georgia Chapter of the ACP with distinction.

My journey has been a tapestry of resilience and determination. From being expelled from my birthplace, Tanzania, due to nationalization to surviving the war in Pakistan during my high school years and later enduring the tumultuous Iranian Revolution. Through it all, I battled deadly cases of malaria and typhoid and even emerged as a survivor of a harrowing bus collision with an oil tanker, rescuing fellow passengers.

Life threw more challenges my way – I'm a cancer survivor, a widow, and a single parent due to gun violence. Despite these trials, my path led me to Atlanta, where I miraculously gained entry to Morehouse School of Medicine, a pivotal moment that set the course for my successful 30-year career in Dekalb County. I proudly served on the Board of Dekalb Medical for two decades.

My heart found a home in Clarkston, where I could empathize with the residents. Armed with my education and a network of volunteers, we initiated the Clarkston Community Health Center, a volunteer-operated outpatient clinic that has provided primary and comprehensive care to over 6,500 patients, including women's services. Now, thanks to a generous grant and a donor's vision, we're on the cusp of realizing our dream—a brand-new facility that will expand our impact and continue our mission of caring for those in need.

Thank you for recognizing my journey and the work we've accomplished. I am humbled and filled with gratitude.

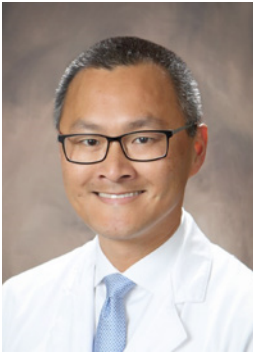

Dr. Albert Johary grew up in rural north Florida, and from an early age, he wanted to become a doctor. He graduated from the University of Florida in 1986 and the University of South Florida College of Medicine in 1990. He then relocated to Atlanta to do his residency at Emory.

In 1993, Dr. Johary joined Atlanta Medical Associates, where he taught medical students from Medical College of Georgia (MCG). In late 1998, he left to start a solo Internal Medicine practice in Dunwoody, GA, where he continued to teach.

Dr. Johary has taught students for over 30 years now. He currently serves as a Clinical Professor at MCG, Associate Professor at Mercer, and an Assistant Professor at Emory.

Dr. Johary has served on the Board of the Medical Association of Atlanta since 2000, attending MAG's House of Delegates many times. I attended Westover High School, and Albany State University, and graduated from high school with my associate's degree. Afterwards, I attended Emory University and majored in biology, volunteered at CHOA, and studied B-cell acute lymphoblastic leukemia, among many other organizations and on campus jobs. Currently, at MCG, I have served as president of the surgery interest group and neurosurgery interest group, as a student ambassador speaking with prospective students, and as the president of our Student National Medical Association.

In these groups, I have assisted in organizing regular weekly suture clinics for students to learn hand tying and instrument tying, guest speaking events, and coordinated practice MMIs, panels, and tours for MSSA, which consists of premed minority undergrad students at UGA. I have also proudly served on the admissions committee for MCG, and as a mentor and cofounder of the Young Physicians Initiative (YPI).

In YPI, we teach high school students about medical decision making, case studies, physical exams, emergency intervention with Stop the Bleed, and the path to medicine through our eyes as students, and the experiences shared by our medical faculty preceptors. Ariana Traub, MPH



Ariana Traub is a third-year medical student at Emory University School of Medicine. Prior to medical school, she earned a Bachelor of Science in Biology and Health: Science, Society, and Policy from Brandies University, and a Master of Public Health in Epidemiology and Global Health from New York University. She went on to work at USAID in the Global Health Bureau, Office of HIV/AIDS, Pediatric and Maternal Branch where she developed data-driven country-specific HIV testing recommendations and fostered the collaboration between clinical staff, community health workers, and peer educators in several PEPFAR countries to identify and treat children living with HIV.

In medical school, Ariana has served as a medical student coordinator at Harriett Tubman Women's Health Clinic; a free clinic dedicated to providing comprehensive reproductive health care to under and uninsured women in the greater Atlanta area. She is also the asylum team director for the Georgia Human Rights Clinic where she works with community partners to ensure those seeking asylum obtain forensic medical evaluation to secure protection from persecution. In response to the challenge of reproductive rights, Ariana co-founded Georgia Health Professionals for Reproductive Justice (GRJ). Their website, monthly newsletters, and social media contain information including relevant journal and media publications, clinical resources for clinicians and patients, educational resources, HIPPA compliant patient stories, and open letter petitions to sign. Ariana has been actively engaged in pushing forward reproductive legislation through the Medical Association of Georgia. Ariana remains dedicated to ensuring everyone has access to evidence-based, equitable healthcare.

Alexander Listur, MD, is currently serving as chief resident at Hamilton Medical Center in Dalton, GA. Alexander completed medical school in Punta del Este, Uruguay.

Alexander is chair of the Scholarly Activity Committee at Hamilton and was instrumental in the development of an academic calendar and the initiation of resident led morning reports.

He was a founding member of the Patient-Family Advisory Committee. During his residency Alexander developed an initiative that assisted patients diagnosed with hepatitis C obtain treatment and follow-up through the infectious disease clinic. He also participated in the development of a project with aims to maximize guideline directed medical therapy in patients diagnosed with heart failure. Alexander worked closely with the Latin American Association to organize health fairs to incentivize access to healthcare for the Latinx community.

Through the American College of Physicians, Alexander had the opportunity to travel to the Nation's capital on ACP Leadership Day to speak with representatives of the state of Georgia in the U.S. Congress and Senate. He advocated for the Resident Education Deferred Interest Act, and the Resident Physician Shortage Reduction Act, laws that if passed would defer student loan interest from accruing until completion of training and would add an additional 14,000 GME positions by the year 2030. Alexander was also recently elected as chair of the Georgia ACP Residency Council.

His interests include advocacy, public health, and working with marginalized populations. He plans to pursue a fellowship in infectious disease.
