


Governor's Update



Treasurer's Report

The following is a brief summary of our financial expenditures for the last fiscal year (July 2024-June 2025). In all, our expenses totaled about \$31,000 and our revenue totaled about \$41,000. We had a positive balance of about \$10,000.

Our major expense was our annual state meeting, which we spent just shy of \$13,000 on, including venue, rentals, food, and awards.

We also spent about \$6,000 on sending our student and resident winners to represent Kentucky at the 2025 National ACP Meeting in New Orleans. We sent one person to Leadership Day 2025 in Washington, DC, at a cost of about \$1,000.

Salaries for our administrative assistant, accountant, and fees totaled about \$10,500.

Our two sources of revenue are membership dues and vendor payments from our state meeting. These brought in just over \$41,000.



ACP remains hard at work advocating for policy changes that will make a difference in your daily work, professional development, and your patients' health.

Specifically, ACP is engaged in efforts to stop the implementation of H-1B Visa fees, protecting evidence-based vaccine recommendations, protections for physician reimbursement and supporting access to medical care/health insurance.
