BHCHP cares for more than 12,000 individuals each year by providing an integrated model of care that includes primary care, behavioral health care, and dental care.

Mentoring Collaborative

The Mentoring Collaborative is a Massachusetts ACP led initiative, which intends to provide opportunities for physicians in all stages of training to find mentors in their subjective areas of interests

and needs. Our goal is to provide opportunities for "real time mentoring" at all Massachusetts ACP events, and building a "mentoring database" which includes all Massachusetts ACP members with focus on their areas of interest and expertise, in a user friendly and easily searchable format.

After our June 2013 kickoff event (panel discussion about the concept of mentorship in medicine), we have collected data from 40 physicians who were surveyed in different social and CME events. 80% of the surveyed physicians had indicated that having a mentor at their stage of career is "very important". 66% were open to being a mentor to their colleagues. Apart from emphasis of having access to a mentoring database as well as events to facilitate members' interactions and one to one mentoring opportunities, a recurrent team that also came up was the interest in getting more education about "How to be a good Mentor or Mentee". Therefore, we are committed to provide more formal "mentoring education" to our members. This most likely will be in the form of a weekend workshop winter of 2015. ACP Leadership Academy

The ACP Leadership Academy provides early career internists with the skills and knowledge necessary to become leaders in medicine. The program includes formal live and online courses offered in partnership

with the American College of Physician Executives (ACPE), the nation's largest leadership training organization for physician leaders. Online courses are offered as self-study or faculty led and includes topics such as strategic thinking, financial decision-making, managing physician performance, marketing, ethics, quality management and more.

All courses are eligible for CME credit through the ACPE. They were selected to provide episodic leadership training for members who want to brush up on a specific content area or to earn credits toward the Certified Physician Executive (CPE), a nationally recognized leadership certificate from the ACPE. Credits may also roll into an advanced degree program from selected accredited universities. ACP members receive a 15% discount on approved courses.

In addition, the ACP Leadership Academy is currently accepting registrations for a **series of FREE** (non-CME) **webinars** on a variety of leadership topics. Topics currently scheduled include: May 19, 2015 - Population Health. All webinars start at 6:30 p.m. ET.
