## Dearest Colleagues,

I am writing you to express my interest in serving as Chapter Secretary of our American College of Physicians Maryland Chapter. My name is Aseem Sood. I have been an active member of the ACP Maryland Chapter since 2015. I have been a member of the ACP Council since 2017. I serve as the Chair of the International Medical Graduate Committee, as a member of the Healthcare & Public Policy Committee since 2015, and am the former Chair of the Chief Residents Association of Baltimore. I am humbled to have received the 2020 Maryellen Woodward ACP Maryland Governor's Service Award, earned 1<sup>st</sup> place in the Mulholland-Mohler Poster Competition in 2017, and received the ACP Profiles in Excellence Award in 2016. This Chapter means the world to me because of the brilliance and kind heartedness of the people within it. I am a better physician and educator because of the experiences I have had within our American College of Physicians.

It has been my privilege to get to know many of you in this organization. I have benefitted learning from the role models of professionalism, scientific rigor, and compassion within our Chapter. To those of you whom I have not yet had the chance to meet, I would like to share a bit about myself and why I believe I am the best candidate for this position.

Training in and having the privilege to practice Internal Medicine is the greatest honor of my life. My involvement with the American College of Physicians began as a medical student. I had never interacted with a professional society or attended a medical meeting. I read online about the ACP Maryland Chapter Annual Scientific Meeting at Turf Valley. Being neither an Internist, nor a resident, nor a member of the ACP, I was unsure of my eligibility to participate. I emailed Ms. Maryellen Woodward expressing my interest, and she kindly and warmly invited me to attend free of cost.
