
2024 MN-ACP Award Winners

2024 Laureate Award Winner

Andrew Olson, MD, FAAP, FACP

Minneapolis, MN

Dr. Andrew Olson is an advocate, a medical educator, a leader and a MN Twins baseball fan. He has served on the MN-ACP Council for the past eight years, served on the MN-ACP Conference Planning Committee for the past seven years and chaired the abstract competition for the past seven years. Additionally, he has provided outreach to the Duluth Medical school campus for IMIG events/ educational sessions and provided training and outreach to Duluth area internists. He serves as the co-chair of the Education Committee of the Society to Improve Diagnosis in Medicine and is an investigator on multiple projects to improve diagnosis in education and practice. He has numerous publications and presentations. Honors and awards include: Minnesota Monthly Magazine "Top Doctors", the Mpls. St.Paul Magazine "Top Doctor - Rising Star" and recently awarded the ACP Herbert S. Waxman Award for Outstanding Medical Student Educator in 2020.







2024 Hospitalist Award Winner Michael May, MD, FACPWillmar, MN

Nominators for Dr. May were quick to praise his work as a hospitalist. "If one was to design the perfect rural hospitalist and a rural physician-leader, you would design Dr. Mike May. We should use him as the template as we train students and residents.... Dr. May completed medical school at the University of Minnesota and an Internal Medicine Residency at Abbott Northwestern Hospital in Minneapolis. He works as a Hospitalist at the CentraCare- Rice Memorial Hospital in Willmar, MN.



2024 Distinguished Teacher/Mentor award Alisa Duran, MD, FACP

St. Paul, MN

Dr. Alisa Duran is the Women's Health Medical Director and Associate Chief of Faculty Affairs at the VA Healthcare System in Minneapolis. She is also a Professor of Medicine at the University of Minnesota. Previously she served as an Internal Medicine Residency Program Director. Nominators for Dr. Duran praised her work with residents and students at the VA health system and at the U of M. Nominators praised Dr. Duran's work as a teacher and mentor for residents and physicians. "She has shed blood, sweat and tears to champion residents and their work." "She has been a tremendous advocate for physicians and their academic careers at the VA system and the U of M system." Dr. Duran has received the Inspiration Award from the American Medical Association, the Educational Excellence Award from the VA Healthcare System and was identified as a Top Doctor for Women by MN Monthly.

Dr. Duran completed medical school at the University of Iowa and an Internal Medicine Residency at the University of Minnesota.

2024 Early Career Physician award Jessie Roske, MD St. Cloud, MN

Dr. Jessie Roske is a hospitalist and the Physician Section Director within Performance Excellence section. She is currently also developing CentraCare's Graduate Medical Education program in collaboration with the University of Minnesota. Her leadership is exemplified by her work in several key initiatives including: On-boarding New Physicians; Chair of Ethics Committee; Documentation Optimization; and Clinical Care Improvement Initiatives. She is also active in the Society for Hospital Medicine (SHM). Nominators said, "Having worked with Jessie in both her clinical and leadership roles, I've been struck by the passion, intensity, expertise, and radical, empathetic candor with which she brings to work every day. Jessie has high expectations of herself and consistently delivers." Another nominator said that Dr. Roske "follows her moral compass and puts the patient in the center of what we do, especially in difficult circumstances. In short, Jessie is not only an exemplar of an "early career" physician, but also a model for the continuous self-development that is so essential for clinicians."



She has been a member of ACP since 2011 and is 12 years out of medical school. She graduated from the University of Minnesota Medical school and completed her internal Medicine residency at the University of Minnesota.



2024 Advancing Women in Internal Medicine Award Anya Jamrozy, MD, FACP Minneapolis, MN

Dr. Anya Jamrozy has chaired the Women Internist committee for MN-ACP for the past five years where she has been active in supporting women internists advance to FACP and as a speaker at the annual conference. She has served on the MN-ACP Council for twelve years as well as serving on the Conference Planning Committee for the past six years. Her creative methods for engaging residents and Early Career women internal medicine physicians have been legendary.
