The 2026 awards ceremony will honor five Utah Chapter members: **Andrew Chang MD & Anne Cioletti MD** are being presented with the Distinguished Teacher/Mentor award for their demonstration of outstanding mentorship of students, residents and colleagues and service to the community; **Nathan Ragle, MD** is being presented with the Internist Award for his dedicated practice of internal medicine and exemplary patient care; **Jacy Leon, MD [R]** will receive the Resident/Fellow Award for leadership in his residency program and going above what is required for a resident in the Utah Chapter ACP and **Mya Vu [MS]** is being recognized for her demonstrated commitment to excellence in medical care, the chapter, and the ACP.

Distinguished Teacher/Mentor Awarded to Andrew Chang MD & Anne Cioletti MD

This award is given to a College Member or Fellow who has demonstrated outstanding mentorship of students, residents and colleagues as demonstrated by a sustained commitment to providing personal and professional guidance to other health care professionals.



Dr. Andrew A. Chang is an Associate Professor of Medicine and an internal medicine primary care physician at the University of Utah. A faculty member at the Spencer Fox Eccles School of Medicine, he serves as a Learning Community Coach and Director of the Learning Environment (DOLE), where he focuses on professionalism and student mistreatment. Additionally, as faculty in the Academy for Communication in Healthcare (ACH), he specializes in teaching clinical communication skills.

Dr. Chang earned his medical degree from New York Medical College and completed his residency and chief residency at the NYU-Bellevue Internal Medicine Primary Care program. Before joining the University of Utah, he spent 15 years serving the New York City public hospital system.



Anne Cioletti MD is a professor of internal medicine and the Associate Chief of General Internal Medicine at the University of Utah. She went to medical school at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and completed her residency and chief resident year at George Washington University in the Primary Care Track. Prior to joining the University of Utah, she served as an Associate Program Director for Internal Medicine Residency Programs at George Washington University and Dell Medical School at the University of Texas, designing the educational curriculum in outpatient education and quality improvement as well as Internal Medicine Residency primary care track development. At the University of Utah, she also directs the Department of Internal Medicine Mentorship Program and has had the privilege of mentoring students, residents, and faculty across three different institutions.

Internist Awarded to Nathan Ragle MD



This award is given to a chapter Member, Fellow or Master who has an exemplary record in patient care. The awardee will also be a respected member of the physician community, dedicated to the practice of internal medicine and/or an internal medicine subspecialty and helpful to his/her colleagues.

Nathan Ragle, MD, is a primary care physician at the University of Utah Madsen Internal Medicine Clinic, where he has practiced for 16 years. Originally from Anchorage, Alaska, he received his undergraduate degree in Chemistry from the University of Puget Sound and subsequently earned his medical degree from the Chicago Medical School. He completed his residency training in Internal Medicine at the University of Utah.

Dr. Ragle's professional interests include longitudinal patient care and the development of strong therapeutic relationships. He is committed to continuous professional growth and to adapting his clinical practice to advancements in the field of medicine. Outside of his clinical work, he enjoys soccer, walking his dog, mountain biking and spending time with his wife and three children.

Resident/Fellow Awarded to Jacy Leon, MD



Jacy Leon, MD, is a Chief Medical Resident in Internal Medicine at the University of Utah and will begin a cardiology fellowship later this year. He earned his medical degree from The Ohio State University College of Medicine and completed his internal medicine residency at the University of Utah.
