ACP Health Policy Internship - Application Deadline is October 31st

The ACP Health Policy Internship provides a multifaceted opportunity to learn about the legislative process, health policy, and advocacy in organized medicine. Interns will provide assistance with researching and analyzing current issues in health and medical education policy, on-going advocacy initiatives, and the development of advocacy materials. Interns will have the opportunity to attend Congressional hearings, coalition meetings, issue briefings, and accompany government affairs staff on lobby visits to members of congress and their staff, political action committee (PAC) fundraisers, and to other events. The interns will participate in ACP's Leadership Day, including assisting with programming during the two-day meeting. Take Action Now! Safety for Domestic Violence Victims: Closing Wisconsin's Misdemeanor Loophole

Wisconsin healthcare practitioners can promote policy change to make life safer for those impacted by domestic violence. We can urge our legislators to address a loophole in Wisconsin law allowing those convicted of misdemeanor domestic violence to still legally own firearms.

In 2022, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled that Wisconsin's existing laws could no longer be used to disarm many domestic abusers. While federal law prohibits people convicted of domestic violence misdemeanor from purchasing firearms, Wisconsin lacks a specific domestic violence status to trigger this prohibition. This has led to an unfortunate loophole, raising the risk for victims of domestic violence, and even for abusers themselves.

The single greatest predictor of violent acts is a history of violent or aggressive acts, including domestic violence. A woman in an abusive

relationship is five times as likely to be killed if her abuser has access to a gun. In more than two-thirds of mass shootings between 2014 and 2019, the shooter either had a history of domestic violence or killed a family member or partner.

Wisconsin ranks 8th in the country in the number of women murdered by men. Between 2000 and 2020, there was a 62% increase in intimate partner homicides in Wisconsin. The most recent report from End Abuse Wisconsin shows that in 2023, domestic violence claimed 85 lives in Wisconsin and in 78% of those deaths firearms were the weapons used.

Action Requested: <u>Please write to your Wisconsin</u> representatives to request they take action to save lives by closing this loophole and prohibiting those convicted of domestic violence misdemeanor from owning firearms.
